Numerous factors influence a child's affinity for specific teachers and classes. Yet, a significant determinant of both positive and negative outcomes lies in the extent to which children are actively involved in their own learning.

### **Engaged Hearts Lead to Engaged Minds**

At the core of our philosophy lies a resolute belief: a child who is dynamically engaged in the learning journey—both physically and mentally—absorbs knowledge more profoundly and effectively.

The cornerstone of the Reggio Emilia philosophy proclaims that children possess the ability to construct their own learning. This fundamental tenet underscores that children warrant a leading role in shaping their education. They are not passive recipients perched in chairs but active co-creators of their educational experiences.

Recall your most cherished class once again. Chances are its allure was rooted in the teacher's adeptness at engaging you as an eager learner. Now pivot to your least favorite class. It's plausible that you felt subjected to monologue rather than dialogue—a mere listener rather than a participant. Reggio Emilia educators don't merely involve their students; they actively engage them in decision-making about what and how they learn.

Let's allay any apprehensions of students overthrowing their educators and assuming control. Reggio Emilia promotes a harmonious balance wherein children explore their interests within a scaffold provided by teachers.

### **The Essence of Collaboration**

Deeper engagement is our aspiration, yet the Reggio Emilia approach strives for more—a meaningful partnership between educators and students. At Little Sunshine's, our teachers endeavor to collaborate with their students. This approach seeks to amplify each child's voice, fostering a sense of belonging within the community while nurturing their individual identities.

This collaboration mirrors the dynamics of adults collaborating in the professional realm. Imagine collaborating with Karen on a project. Karen is a capable colleague brimming with insights and contributions. When you pool your resources, the mutual respect you hold leads to fruitful collaboration—an endeavor to produce excellence together.

However, if Karen dictates the project without soliciting your input, she overlooks your unique perspective that could elevate the project. Is Karen wrong? Not necessarily. But by dismissing diverse ideas, she denies the project its full potential. Karen, in essence, needs to value your insights, involve you, and tap into the collective wisdom.

The same ethos guides us with the children in our classrooms. While we provide a framework for their learning, our teachers genuinely listen to their input as they shape the learning journey.

Why? Because children harbor remarkable ideas.
